THE POOR ARE GOD'S FAVOURITES

"Christ although he was rich, he made himself poor to make you rich through his poverty." (2 Cor 8:9)

Jesus in the Sermon on the Mount proclaimed that it is not the rich who are blessed or fortunate, but the poor. The poor seem to be God's favourites. They are called -the anawim of Yahweh the poor of the Lord in the Bible. They were desperately in need and were open to receive whatever God wants to give them, his word, himself. The Shepherds, Mary, Joseph, Elizabeth, Simeon, Anna belong to this category. Mary found favor with God because of her total self emptying and the receptivity to the fullness of God's grace. She responded with total openness to God's invitation for the 'Word' to be conceived in her womb and said "Behold the handmaid of the Lord, be it done to me according to your word". St. Paul in his letter to the Philippians portrays the utter humility of self emptying of Jesus. "Though divine in nature, he emptied himself, taking on the nature of a servant, made in human likeness". (Phil 2L6-7) For this reason God exalted and glorified him and now his name is honored throughout the world.

God is rich in every aspect. There is no emptiness in God. He is fullness brimming over, overflowing. It is John who says that "Out of His fullness we have all received grace upon grace". (Jn 1:16) It is God who is always giving, takes the initiatives in His search for emptiness in the human soul. He provides challenges to the soul to surrender, and gradually hollows out emptiness within the soul that He might fill it with Himself. God needs our poverty, our nothingness to fill us with His love and His presence. "Christ although he was rich, he made himself poor to make you rich through his poverty." (2 Cor 8:9)

What is it to be poor? After the famous judgment St. Francis of Assisi went out without his money, without his clothes, without even his father. It was a cold winter and snowing. Yet he went out singing. And he was singing for joy. And he was joyful not because he was poor but because he was rich. He had, it is true given up his worldly possessions, a few thousands, may be a few lakhs, but now he had much more valuable possessions. He had given up his earthly father, and now God was his father. And since God was his father, everything God possessed was his. He felt that the birds and the trees and the hills and the sky and the animals were all his. When he gave up all, he possessed all. Now he was not poor, he was very rich. Christian poverty means possession of God, the experience of the sufficiency of God's love. I don't need His gifts; I am not dependent on anything else because I possess the Giver, the Creator. How can I possibly want or need any of His gifts or creatures?

The process of becoming 'poor in spirit' is detachment, the ability to let go. Without freedom from attachments we cannot love fully and unconditionally. We are free to love until we are willing to stop clinging to our possessions of one kind or another. Our egos chain us down with a multitude of attachments, to people, to things, to times and places, to reputation and image, to professions and ministries, to power, status and position, to our ideas and practices, to success and to life itself. We can become attached to any number of other things too, like cleanliness, neatness, and order, our likes and dislikes, our preferences in food and drink. We can become compulsive and unyielding about them. That is not freedom. And the list goes on endlessly. Letting go of our attachments requires self-discipline. None of this is possible without putting one's faith and trust in God. It is a surrender of the attachments or inordinate desires we have, one by one in prayer, with total trust and focus on God and His sufficiency. Liberating ourselves from attachments one by one is the work of a lifetime. Trusting God as Jesus did means letting go of everything so as to surrender ourselves and our lives to God. The freedom that comes from poverty enables one to preach, to pray, to praise God and to serve others. Poverty does bring peace and joy.

It was our foundress Venerable Mother Veronica who expressed the experience of her inner joy and peace after her baptism in the Catholic Church in the words: O my God! I had so many things to say to Him that I think I said nothing. I remained engulfed in silence but I felt that I possessed my God. I had everything. The whole world was nothing to me anymore". His hiddenness drives her to seek Him everywhere, regarding all else as worthless in comparison with the joy of possessing Him. Nevertheless the search for God must be marked with the seal of suffering love. All through her life she went through the purification in the crucible of suffering. She learned to accept in peace the nothingness of her creature hood, the sinfulness of her fallen nature, the helplessness of human weakness to accomplish the slightest achievement in the realm of grace. This was in truth her meeting place with God. In losing all, she possessed All, her God.

But in a situation like this I had to tackle the student prudently. I questioned her regarding her action. And her emphatic reply to my question was "no sister, I am not wrong". All the students were stunned and stared at me. I tried to convince her of her fault, but it was of no use. Finally I told her to go to the chapel soon after the catechism class and listen to what Jesus had to say.

It was lunch break and I collected my books and went to the convent, hardly had I entered the convent gate than the proud, self willed girl Wilma came sobbing towards me breathlessly, muttering "I am sorry sister, what I did was wrong". I was stunned and I gently asked her "what happened Wilma?" She replied still crying "sister at your request I went to the chapel and knelt down to pray. Then all of a sudden I felt something deep down within me. Now I know what I did was wrong. I'm sorry sister" and she wept.

I was astonished at the sudden change in Wilma and thanked God for the marvel He worked in her.

There is yet another instance that occurred in the same year. This concerns Thelma a STD X student, brilliant, but haughty and proud.

It so happened that one day Thelma was having a hot discussion with her companions regarding religion. Her argument was that all religions are the same and she would say "since I am born in a catholic family I am made to believe that catholic religion is the true religion. To be a Hindu or a Muslim or a Catholic is same to me. I believe in God. You may call him Krishna, Allha or Jesus; it means the same to me. The only difference is in the name - The rest is all man made. God means to me a supreme power who keeps the world in control and moving.

My fear was that she with this attitude would influence the mind of others and weaken their faith. I had to tackle her prudently. Arguments were of no use to convince her. It was God who had to change her mind.

Luckily she was my boarder. So I made use of this opportunity to instil in her love for God. Daily after the rosary we



would read the Gospel passage and then reflect on the word of God for about five minutes and then pick up the message it offered to practise it during the day.

The SSLC examination was fast approaching and the boarders were earnestly preparing themselves to face the Public exam. They were permitted to sit up in the night up to 11.00 p.m. for their studies during the examination days.

Normally the leader would switch off the light at 11.00 p.m and then all would go to bed. When all had gone to bed, I would take a walk in the dormitory to see if all was well and then retire for the day.

It so happened that one night as I was taking my usual rounds in the dormitory, I noticed Thelma reading under dim night light, and I casually asked her "Why are you reading in the dim light?" thinking that she was preparing for the next day's public examination. Her prompt reply was "Sister I'm reading the Bible. I never go to bed without reading it" I was stunned to hear it; could it be true or was I dreaming? Then realizing the truth I turned to God deep within me and thanked Him for yet another marvel He brought in Thelma.

She is now married and well settled in USA. A couple of years ago when she had come to her native place, she came to the convent to pay me a visit. We shared many things of the past, but I was most happy and thrilled when she told me that she still continues to read the Bible, not only she but also her children. I was so thrilled and I expressed my appreciation for her in keeping alive the thirst for the Holy Scripture and yet more for the passing of it on to her children.

Isn't God's power still at work? He does work silently, relentlessly, continually and effectively.

Yes, God took delight in the praises of children and answered their plea and showed them that He is the God of wonders.

It happened on 22 July. As usual Sr Premlatha, the warden had made all the children sleep by 9.30 p.m. When clock struck ten in the night, there was a sudden knock on the community door. The Superior, Sr Sujyothi opened the door to find a few frightened children telling her, that Jasmine, an eight year old child had a fall from her cot and was very sick. Sr Sujvothi informed Sr Adelcia and both of them rushed to the orphanage. They found Jasmine, throwing up her legs as she groaned, without being aware of anything around her. As she was being resuscitated, Jasmine became limp as though she were dead. Sr Premlatha too arrived on the spot. By then most of the seventy seven primary school children in the two dormitories were already awake. They were seen gathered around the statue of the Infant Jesus and interceding for the recovery of Jasmine on their own accord, for they perceived the seriousness of her condition. They prayed spontaneously, sang bhajans and hymns, joining their hands, closing their eyes and on their knees. They did not stop doing so while immediate arrangements were made to shift her in the Betharam Fathers vehicle to Fr. Muller's Hospital. The sisters at home too continued to pray with the children. Sr Jenita and I accompanied Jasmine to the hospital. At first she seemed to be calm, but on nearing the hospital she became restless once again.

On reaching the hospital, the doctors asked several questions regarding Jasmine's illness. They injected medication and said that she had to be in the I.C.U. Sr Jenita kept Sr Sujyothi informed regarding Jasmine's condition. It seemed as though the prick of the needle awakened Jasmine; she opened her eyes, smiled and wanted

to get back to the Children's Home immediately. She did not want to remain in the hospital any longer. She spoke to the Superior herself over the phone.

Here in the orphanage, children were overwhelmed with joy; their prayer of intercession turned to thanksgiving and praising the Lord, for He alone could bring Jasmine back to "life" they said. A few children exclaimed, we trusted in the Lord Jesus and knew that within the period of half an hour, we would get the news of Jasmine's recovery. We bow our heads to the Lord and say, "Out of the mouth of babes you have found praise, Lord ".

Sr Jenita and I brought Jasmine back to our home by 12.30 a.m. on 23rd July. The children received Jasmine with hugs and kisses and thanked Infant Jesus and Mother Mary, for this great miracle for Jasmine and for them too.

A lame crow, who visited her room daily after her breakfast, was also found flying outside her hospital window during her last days. (6,4).
- 4. She used to attend Cenacle prayer meetings. Whenever she would visit homes where there was a death to console people. Her favourite prayer was "Mary my mother, my refuge, transform me fully to be like Jesus" (8).
- **8.** In spite of the awareness of the killer disease in her(cancer) she kept her cool, devoting herself to the mission. Her students and their parents held her in high esteem. Many of those lived with her say that she was incapable of hurting others.(7).
- 11. Lions' Club Bokaro Thermal, awarded her the 'Best Teacher Award' in 1997. In the Community, she was called 'Simeon' for she prayed arms lifted up, with unction, with a prophetic tone, loud and distinct, deliberate and clear. (9)
- **14.** Generous and thoughtful in various ways, ready for service whether in the community or school, she was appreciated for all she was and did in the convents and institutions where she toiled for forty years. (8)

15. As a girl, she went to work in Bombay to supplement the family income. As a Sister, she was often seen caressing and talking to plants, chickens and domestic animals; and they flocked to the sound of her voice and responded to her love.(6)

- 10. She was a lively person, enlivened the community with narration of jokes and amusing incidents. Gifted with melodious voice sang lustily the songs learned in her school days. She would recite extracts from poems and jokes of bygone days. (8).
- 11. She helped many adults to become Catholics. She went all out to care for the poor. She listened to their tales of woe and offered relief both spiritual and material. The Parish Priest said that she, not only helped people for their materiel needs, but also healed their souls. (5)
- 13. AT night recreation, she used to read an article of the constitution; then narrate a short story, more often spun from her vivid imagination. The community used to enjoy her sense of wit and humour, and her smile, a reflection of her guileless soul. (9)

DOWN.

- Boarders had a special place in her heart; she lovingly cared for them. Her winning smile and gentle ways made them run to her for every need. Obedience took her to Kulu Valley. She must have been delighted with the scenic beauty, yet had to cope with the severe cold and moments of loneliness as well. "Moments of loneliness "she once said to some "are a blessing for us. They teach us to cling to Jesus". (4,4).
- Try as we might, we cannot recall a single occasion when 3. Sister, in any way seemed dissatisfied. This was so for, her two occupations were prayer and service. Hers was a healthy mind in a sickly body. She did her duty in time and kept company with the Lord. When asked, she answered, "some days I am in the well, and sometimes outside the well". (8)
- Many Priests from De Nobili, Digwadih, used to come to her 5. for prayer for their special intentions. Some attributed the favours they received through her intercessory prayer. Compassion for the weak, the sick, the lonely, was one of her special traits of character. (6)

BACK.

- 6 This Sister was appreciated for her thoroughness in whatever she undertook. She was adept at needlework. Her skill in lace making and embroidery was remarkable. She completed 83 years in 2000. She died on 12th September. (8)
- At the age of sixties the Angel of death called her home. Previous evening, she accompanied a Sister to the dentist. After supper she felt a little uneasy and went to bed. She was restless, experienced pain in the left side. Visited National Hospital next morning. Doctors found her condition quite bad. There she suffered a severe heart attack. Doctors did their best, but God took her at 6.30 p.m. the same evening. (7)
- 9. Besides teaching in school, she directed Bulbuls and Guides. In teaching, she showed great concern for every child. She composed short and simple Biblical plays and songs which her students acted out. Having retired from active teaching, organized remedial classes for school dropouts and backward students. When she became really feeble and had to depend on others, she would say "I must let go everything. It's hard to say 'yes' to God's will. I pray, He gives me strength to say, 'Thy will be done". (7)
- 12. She loved Cindy, the convent dog. It had to be guarded against any dog intruding into the convent. Winter clothes, special bedding her skillful hands were producing for it. Cindy lived in state as long as this Sister was around. (7,1,4).
